GEODESIC LINES IN D RECURRENT FINSLER SPACES

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Abstract. A D recurrent Finsler space is defined as a Finsler space in which the absolute differential of the metric tensor is recurrent. For some special cases of the parameter and the vector of recurrency some interesting special cases are obtained. An example is the non-recurrent Finsler space with Cartain connection coefficients. After introducing the so called Y connection [5], it is examined in which special case of a D recurrent Finsler space the introduced Y connection will give a recurrent Riemannian space. Finally different kinds of definition of a geodesic line are given. The relation between them and the projective change of the metric function are examined. It is prooved that in a D recurrent Finsler space the geodesic line does not depend on the connection coefficients, but only on the metric function of the space.

1. D recurrent Finsler space. If in a Finsler space $F_n(M, L)$ the metric function $L(x, \dot{x})$ is as usually homogeneous of degree one in \dot{x} , and it the metric tensor is defined by

Definition 1.1. Finsler F_n is D recurrent if there are vector fields $\lambda^{\gamma} = \lambda^{\gamma}(x, \dot{x})$ and $\mu^{\gamma} = \mu^{\gamma}(x, \dot{x})$ homogeneous of degree zero in \dot{x} , such that

This is the crucial relation which shows that dx^{γ} and Dl^{γ} are not linearly independent. For $\lambda = 0$ and $\mu = 0$, i. e. when $Dg_{\alpha\beta} = 0$, (1.10) reduces to the well-known relation

Definition 1.2. A D recurrent Finsler space in which the (h)h and (v)v torsion tensors Γ and A are determined by (1.21) and (1.22) will be called D(W) space.

In this space the connection coefficients are determined by (1.17), (1.18), (1.21) and (1.22).

Theorem 1.1. In a D recurrent Finsler space the metric tensor is \mid and \mid recurrent if

Definition 1.3. A D recurrent Finsler space in which (1.23) is valid i. e. in which (1.24) and (1.25) hold will be called a D(k) recurrent Finsler space.

Theorem 1.2. Every D(k) recurrent Finsler space in D recurrent.

Cartain connection coefficient which follows from (1.28 a) and (1.33), but $A_{\alpha\beta\gamma} \neq 2^{-1}L\dot{\partial}_{\gamma}g_{\alpha\beta}$ because of (1.28 b).

In a D(k=-1)(TF) space Dl^{δ} cannot be determined by (1.5). In this space (1.34) gives that (1.5) reduces to $dl^{\delta} + \Gamma^{*\delta}_{o\beta} dx^{\beta} = 0$ from which $d\dot{x}^{\delta}$ can be expressed and Dl^{δ} should satisfy (1.10).

2. Metrical spaces. Definition 2.1. A Finsler space will be called D, | and | metrical if $Dg_{\alpha\beta}=0$, $g_{\alpha\beta|\gamma}=0$ and $g_{\alpha\beta|\gamma}=0$ respectively. (See (1.7), (1.8)).

Theorem 2.1. If a Finsler space is D metrical, i. e.

In a $D(k)(Y_0)$ space the connection coefficients F are given by (3.17) in which $\Gamma_{\alpha\beta\gamma}^*$ and $A_{\alpha\beta\gamma}$ are determined by (1.26) and (1.27) respectively.

Theorem 3.5. In a $D(k)(Y_0)$ space the Riemannian metric \overline{g} is \top recurrent with respect to the connection coefficient F in this space. The vector of recurrency is given by

A D(k)(TF) space in which $\dot{x}^{\alpha} = T^{\alpha}(X)$ and L(x), Y(x) = 1, i. e. a $D(k)(Y_0)$ space in which the torsion tensors are zero will be called a $D(k)(TF)(Y_0)$ space.

Theorem 3.7. In a D(k)(TF)(Y) and a $D(k)(TF)(Y_0)$ space in which one of the conditions (3.21 a) or (3.21 b) hold is \top metrical, i. e., $\overline{g}_{\alpha\beta \top \gamma} = 0$ with respect to the connections $F_{\alpha\beta\gamma}$ which are determined by (3.9), (2.6), (2.7) and in D(k)(TF)(Y) we have $Y^{\iota}_{|\gamma}$ determined by (3.6) whereas in $D(k)(TF)(Y_0)$ determined by (3.18).

This theorem is a special case of Theorem 3.6. when the torsion tensors are zero.

Proof. In Thorem 2.3. and 2.4. we proved that under conditions (3.21 a) and (3.21b) in a D(k)(TF) space the condition coefficients Γ^* and A have the form given by (2.6) and (2.7), i. e., they are Cartain connection coefficients.

Note. The Y connection examined in [5] is a special case of the connection in a $D(k)(TF)(Y_0)$ space when (3.21 a) is valid.

4. Geodesic lines in D recurrent Finsler spaces. Definition 4.1. The geodesic line of a D recurrent Finsler space is the solution of the variation problem

5. Projective change of metric in a D recurrent Finsler space. Definition 5.1. If the geodesic line of the Finsler space $F_n(M,L)$ is the geodesic line of the Finsler space $\overline{F}_n(M,\overline{L})$ and the inverse is also true, then the change $L \to \overline{L}$ of the metric function is called projective.

We shall examine the change of the metric function of the form

$$(\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\overline{L}^{2})\dot{x}^{\theta} = (\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L^{2})\dot{x}^{\theta} + 2(\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)\dot{x}^{\theta} + 2(\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)\dot{x}^{\theta} + 2(\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)(\partial_{\theta}\beta)\dot{x}^{\theta} + 2(\partial_{\theta}L)(\partial_{\delta}\beta)\dot{x}^{\theta} + 2(\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)\dot{x}^{\theta} + (\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta^{2})\dot{x}^{\theta}$$

(c)
$$(\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\overline{L}^{2})\ddot{x}^{\theta} = (\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L^{2})\ddot{x}^{\theta} + 2(\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)\ddot{x}^{\theta}\beta + 2(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)(\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\beta)\ddot{x}^{\theta} + 2(\dot{\partial}_{\theta}L)(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)\ddot{x}^{\theta} + 2L(\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)\ddot{x}^{\theta} + (\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta^{2})\ddot{x}^{\theta}$$

$$(d) -\partial_{\delta}L^{2} = -\partial_{\delta}L^{2} - 2\beta\partial_{\delta}L - 2L\partial_{\delta}\beta - \partial_{\delta}\beta^{2}.$$

Using the notation

(5.4)
$$E_{\delta}(G) = 2^{-1} [(\partial_{\theta} \dot{\partial}_{\delta} G) \dot{x}^{\theta} + (\dot{\partial}_{\theta} \dot{\partial}_{\delta} G) \ddot{x}^{\theta} - \partial_{\delta} G]$$

where $G = G(x, \dot{x})$ is any function homogeneous of degree two in \dot{x} , if we add (5.3.b), (5.3.c) and (5.3.d) previously multiplied by 2^{-1} , after some calculations we obtain

$$E_{\delta}(\overline{L}^{2}) = (1 + \beta L^{-1})E_{\delta}(L^{2}) + (1 + L\beta^{-1})E_{\delta}(\beta^{2}) + L\beta(\dot{\partial}_{\delta} \ln L - \dot{\partial}_{\delta} \ln \beta)(d\ln \beta/dt - d\ln l/dt).$$

On the other hand, it is known that

$$\begin{split} \gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(L^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} &= 2^{-1}(\partial_{\alpha}g_{\delta\beta} + \partial_{\beta}g_{\alpha\delta} - \partial_{\delta}g_{\alpha\beta})\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} &= \\ &= 2^{-1}(\partial_{\alpha}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\dot{\partial}_{\beta}L^2 + \partial_{\beta}\dot{\partial}_{\alpha}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L^2 - \partial_{\delta}\dot{\partial}_{\alpha}\dot{\partial}_{\beta}L^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta}. \end{split}$$

So we have

(5.5)
$$\gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(L^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} = 2^{-1}[(\partial_{\alpha}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha} - \partial_{\delta}L^2].$$

If we introduce the notations

(5.6)
$$\gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(G)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} = 2^{-1}[\partial_{\alpha}(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}G)\dot{x}^{\alpha} - \partial_{\delta}G]$$

$$(5.7) g_{\theta\delta}(G) = 2^{-1}\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}G$$

then from (5.2) we obtain

$$(5.8) g_{\theta\delta}(\overline{L}^2) = g_{\theta\delta}(L^2) + 2g_{\theta\delta}(L\beta) + g_{\theta\delta}(\beta^2)$$

(5.9)
$$\gamma_{\alpha\beta\delta}(\overline{L}^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} = [\gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(L^2) + 2\gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(L\beta) + \gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(\beta^2)]\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta}.$$

Using (5.6), (5.7) and (5.4) we have

(5.10)
$$E_{\delta}(G) = g_{\theta\delta}(G)\ddot{x}^{\theta} + \gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(G)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta}.$$

Theorem 5.1. If the geodesic line in the Finsler space $F_n(M,L)$ is defined by Definition 4.1. then the change of the metric function $L \to \overline{L} = L + \beta$ is projective when $E_{\delta}(\beta^2) = -2E_{\delta}(L\beta)$.

Proof. From (5.8) — (5.10) we obtain

(5.11)
$$E_{\delta}(\overline{L}^2) = E_{\delta}(L^2) + 2E_{\delta}(L\beta) + E_{\delta}(\beta^2)$$

from which the theorem follows.

THEOREM 5.2. By the change of the metric function $L \to \overline{L}$, $\overline{L} = \sqrt{L^2 + \beta^2}$ a curve is a geodesic line (in the sence of Definition 4.1) of the Finsler space $F_n(M, \sqrt{L^2 + \beta^2})$ if it is at the same time the geodesic line in $F_n(M, L)$ and $F_n(M, \beta)$.

Proof. From (5.6), (5.7) and $\overline{L}^2 = L^2 + \beta^2$ we get

(5.12)
$$\gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(\overline{L}^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} = [\gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(L^2) + \gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(\beta^2)]\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta}$$

(5.13)
$$g_{\theta\delta}(\overline{L}^2) = g_{\theta\delta}(L^2) + g_{\theta\delta}(\beta^2)$$

From (5.12), (5.13) and (5.10) we obtain

$$E_{\delta}(\overline{L}^2) = E_{\delta}(L^2) + E_{\delta}(\beta^2)$$

from which the theorem follows.

It is more usual to define the geodesic line by

 $\label{eq:Definition 5.2.} Definition \ 5.2. \ \ The geodesic line in a \ D \ recurrent \ Finsler \ space is the solution of the variation problem$

The Euler Lagrange equation for this problem is

$$(5.14) \overline{E}_{\delta}(L) = d(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)/dt - \partial_{\delta}L = (\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)\dot{x}^{\theta} + (\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)\ddot{x}^{\theta} - \partial_{\delta}L = 0$$

From (5.5) we obtain

(5.15)
$$\gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(L^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} = L(\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)\dot{x}^{\theta} - L\partial_{\delta}L + (\partial_{\theta}L)(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)x^{\theta}.$$

From (5.7) we have

$$(5.16) g_{\theta\delta}(L^2)\ddot{x}^{\theta} = (\dot{\partial}_{\theta}L)(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)\ddot{x}^{\theta} + L(\dot{\partial}_{\alpha}\dot{\partial}_{\beta}L)\ddot{x}^{\theta}.$$

If we add (5.15) and (5.16), and further use (5.14), we get

$$(5.17) g_{\theta\delta}(L^2) + \gamma_{\alpha\delta\beta}(L^2)\dot{x}^{\alpha}\dot{x}^{\beta} = L\overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + L(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\ln L/dt.$$

Now we can state

Theorem 5.3. The geodesic line of Definition 4.1 coincides with the geodesic line of Definition 5.2 iff

$$(5.18) \qquad (\dot{\partial}_{\delta} L) d \ln L / dt = 0$$

Proof. Using (5.10), (5.17) has the form

$$E_{\delta}(L^2) = L\overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + L(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\ln L/dt$$

from which the theorem follows.

When the normal parameter is used, i. e. when L(x, dx/ds) = 1, then (5.18) is satisfied and the geodesic lines of Definition 4.1 and 5.2 coincide.

If we introduce the so called Randers change $L \to \overline{L} = L + \beta$ we have the following

Theorem 5.4. In a D recurrent Finsler space the Randers change of the metric function is projective iff

(5.20)
$$\overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) = (\partial_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)\dot{x}^{\theta} + (\dot{\partial}_{\theta}\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)\ddot{x}^{\theta} - \partial_{\delta}\beta = 0$$

where the geodesic line is defined by Definition 5.2.

Proof. From (5.2) and (5.14) we obtain

(5.21)
$$\overline{E}_{\delta}(\overline{L}) = \overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + \overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta)$$

from which the theorem follows.

A special case of Theorem 5.4. is the result of Hashiguchi and Ishijyo [5] where $\beta = b_{\delta}(x) \cdot \dot{x}^{\delta}$. In this case (5.20) reduces to $(\partial_{\theta}b_{\delta} - \partial_{\delta}b_{\theta})\dot{x}^{\theta} = 0$.

Theorem 5.5. Under the change $L \to \overline{L} = L + \beta$ of the metric function in a D recurrent Finsler space we have

$$(5.22) 2E_{\delta}(L\beta) = \beta \overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + L\overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\beta/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)dL/dt$$

$$\begin{split} &Proof. \text{ From } (5.19), (5.1), (5.21) \text{ and } (5.11) \text{ we get} \\ &E_{\delta}(\overline{L}^2) =^{(5.19)} \overline{LE}_{\delta}(\overline{L}) + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\overline{L})d\overline{L}/dt =^{(5.1)} \\ &(L+\beta)\overline{E}_{\delta}(L+\beta) + \dot{\partial}_{\delta}(L+\beta)d(L+\beta)/dt =^{(5.21)} \\ &L\overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + \beta\overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + L\overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) + \beta\overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) + \\ &(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)dl/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\beta/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)dL/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)d\beta/dt =^{(5.9)} \\ &E_{\delta}(L^2) + E_{\delta}(\beta^2) + \beta\overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + L\overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\beta/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)dL/dt =^{(5.11)} \\ &E_{\delta}(\overline{L}^2) - 2E_{\delta}(L\beta) + \beta\overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + L\overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\beta/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)dL/dt \end{split}$$

from which (5.22) follows.

From (5.22) it follows that under the change of the metric function $L \to \overline{L} = L + \beta$ a curve is the geodesic line (by Definition 4.1) of the space $F_n(M, \sqrt{L\beta})$ iff

$$\beta \overline{E}_{\delta}(L) + L \overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\beta/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)dl/dt = 0$$

If $(\dot{\partial}_{\delta}L)d\beta/dt + (\dot{\partial}_{\delta}\beta)dL/dt = 0$ and a curve is the geodesic line in the sense of Definition 5.2. of the space $F_n(M.L)$ and $F_n(M\beta)$ (i.e. $\overline{E}_{\delta}(L) = 0$ and $\overline{E}_{\delta}(\beta) = 0$) then it is also the geodesic line in the sense of Definition 4.1. in the space $F_n(M, \sqrt{L\beta})$ (i.e. $E\delta(\sqrt{L\beta}) = 0$).

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
